Beyond Role Play: Radical Performance in the Classroom

SPECIAL OPENING SESSION Savannah C

Kathy Hytten, Southern Illinois University In this workshop, we will introduce several models for incorporating performance into classroom practice in more radical ways than traditional role play activities. Audience members will participate in one or more performance activities during this session. Performance pedagogy can foster the collaborative exploration of challenging questions by helping students ground their learning in their own embodied memories and experiences and in the relationship of their bodies to others, to the environment, and to as yet unnamed possibilities.

Performance is an important pedagogical method in a variety of contexts. Many practitioners incorporate performance as a way of actively engaging students' bodies and minds in the classroom. Performance activities may help participants create community, develop creative thinking and problem solving skills, feel more comfortable in a variety of speaking situations, apply and explore kinesthetic and visual/spatial knowledges, and develop group communication skills. However, performance activities may be difficult to design, undertake, and lead. As performance scholars, we encourage instructors of all experience levels to incorporate performance into their pedagogy and to push themselves to take risks as they develop such activities—recognizing that performance is by its nature a risky enterprise.

Her numerous articles have appeared in New Literary History, Educational Theory, Journal of Philosophy of Education, Journal of Education, Educational Theory, The Journal of Aesthetic Education, The Journal of Moral Education, Changing English: Studies in Reading and Culture, and The Philosophy of Music Education Review. Honors include Director, National Council of Teachers of English; Director and Lifetime Member, Board of Trustees, Women in Literature and Life Assembly, National Council of Teachers of English; Lifetime Member of the Modern Language Association of America, and Recognition of Service Award, Canadian Council of Teachers of English. Professor Bogdan is a Fellow of the Philosophy of Education Society, and has served within PES on the Committee of Professional Affairs, and as Chair of the Committee on the Status of Women in the Profession. She is currently on the Board of Emeritae, Educating Women, An International and Intergenerational Community of Learning and Inquiry on Women, Gender, and Education. She also serves on the editorial board of The Philosophy of Music Education Review and Reader: Reader-Oriented Theory, Criticism, and Pedagogy. She is the mother of two daughters and grandmother of two granddaughters. Since her retirement Professor Bogdan has returned to formal studies in her primary discipline, piano performance, and considers herself a "serious practicer."

Gloria Ladson-Billings is the Kellner Family Professor of Urban Education and Department Chair of Curriculum and Instruction and Faculty Affiliate in the Department of Educational Policy Studies at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She was the 2005-2006 president of the American Educational Research Association. Ladson-Billings' research examines the pedagogical practices of teachers who are successful with African American students. She also investigates Critical Race Theory applications to education. She is the author of the critically acclaimed books, The Dreamkeepers: Successful teachers of African American children, Crossing over to Canaan: The Journey of New Teachers in Diverse Classrooms, and Beyond the Big House: African American Educators on Teacher Education, and more than 50 journal articles and book chapters. She is the former editor of the American Educational Research Journal and a member of several editorial boards. Her work has won numerous scholarly awards including the H. I. Romnes Faculty Fellowship, The Spencer Post-doctoral Fellowship, and the Palmer O. Johnson outstanding research award. In 2002 she was awarded an honorary doctorate for Umeå University, Umeå Sweden. During the 2003-2004 academic year she was a fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences, Stanford, CA. In fall of 2004 she received the George and Louise Spindler Award from the Council on Anthropology and Education for significant and ongoing contributions to the field of educational anthropology. In the spring of 2005 she was elected to the National Academy of Education and the National Society for the Study of Education. In the fall of 2007 she became the second woman to be ordained as deacon at the Mt. Zion Baptist Church in Madison, WI. In spring 2008 she was awarded the Hilldale Distinguished Faculty Award, the highest distinction offered by the University of Wisconsin-Madison and the Teachers College, Columbia University Distinguished Service Medal.

Susan Douglas Franzosa is Professor and Dean of the Graduate School of Education and Allied Professions at Fairfield University. Prior to her appointment in 2006, she was the Director of the Education Program at the University of Washington, Bothell, Chair of the Department of Education at the University of New Hampshire, the Director of the Women's Studies Program at the University of New Hampshire, and the Director of the UNH Study Abroad Program at Regents College, London. She has twice been a Visiting Scholar at the Institute of Education, University of London, UK, and has taught summer institutes at Bretton Hall College of the University of Leeds. Franzosa has been a member of American Educational Studies Association since 1980 and was elected the association's President in 2007. In 1993 and 1994 she chaired the Education and Society Commission for the Cuban and North American Philosophers' Annual Conference in Havana. From 1990 – 1998 she was the Associate Editor of NWSAJ, the National Women's Studies Association Journal. In 1996 she was awarded the Distinguished Alumni Award from the Graduate School of Education at the State University of New York. Franzosa received her BA in English from the University of Connecticut, her M.Ed. in Language Arts from the State University of New York, and was a sixth grade language arts teacher and director of a community based teaching center in Buffalo, New York before earning her Ph.D. in Philosophy and Education from SUNY. She is the coauthor of Integrating Women's Studies Into the Curriculum, and editor of Civic Education: Its Limits and Conditions and Ordinary Lessons: Girlhoods of the 1950s. Civic Education and Ordinary Lessons received Critics Choice Awards from AESA. Franzosa has published articles on the history of educational thought, civic education, educational equity, curriculum reform, educational autobiography, and narrative theory in educational research. She is a cofounder of the Educating Women Project and serves on the Editorial Board of Catholic Education. Her current research deals with educational autobiography and the history of early childhood curriculum reform initiatives.
